Ingredients - Makes 24

- · 2 cups puffed brown rice cereal (unsweetened)
- · 2 cups rolled oats
- 1/4 cup roasted almonds, chopped
- · 1/4 cup roasted sunflower seeds
- · 1/2 cup shredded coconut
- . 1/2 cup dried fruit, chopped
- · 1/2 cup peanut butter
- · 1/2 cup honey
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup mini chocolate chip (optional)



- Combine cereal, oats, nuts, seeds. coconut and fruit in a large mixing bowl.
- 2 Heat the peanut butter, honey and vanilla in a small sauce pan until warm. Do not boil.
- 3 Pour the peanut butter mixture over the cereal mixture. Mix well while honey is still warm. I use my hands as they are the best tool for this mixing job!
- 4 Pour mixture into a 9x13 pan.
- 5 Pack the mixture down firmly with moist fingers or the bottom of another 9x13 pan sprayed with cooking spray.
- 6 The chocolate lover should sprinkle on the mini chocolate chips at this point and press them in firmly.
- 7 Cover with plastic wrap, and cool completely. Once cool cut into 24 bars.

These Granola bars will sit in the fridge for up to 2 weeks and they still taste great!



Is Cross Hills set to become Yorkshires next Ghost Town?



Craven District
Council announced
on the 22nd July
2014 its plans to
reintroduce car
parking charges
into the two council

car parks in Cross Hills, situated on Hall Street and Milligan's Field. This proposal was originally declined in both 2009 and 2013 due to the adverse effect it would have on the trading of the 50 Independent Businesses that are currently located on the High Street. The current proposals include that Milligan's Field Car Park (located at the Co-op) which has 70 car parking spaces, will incur charges between

the hours of 10am-4pm and will be the designated short stay car park. Hall Street Car Park, which is a 27 space car park, is to be the designated long stay car park.

As a group of Independent Businesses located on and near the High Street in Cross Hills 'South Craven Together' is understandably becoming increasingly concerned with the detrimental effect this new proposition will have within the community. "All we have to do is look online at other small towns that have introduced similar car parking schemes to see that in some cases there has been a 25% decrease in trade in the area. Even if Cross Hills were only to see a 10% decrease this would still see a deficit of hundreds of thousands of pounds lost." said a spokesman for the group.

In the short time since discovering the new proposals for the implementation of car parking charges in Cross Hills the group have put together a petition for both customers and residents to sign and give their views. Within three days 1398 signatures had been collected, no one declined to sign.

Just a few of the comments and views included:

"It will kill local economy"

"It will kill Cross Hills trade as has previously happened in Bingley"

"This is not a tourism town, it's a community"

There are currently 50 businesses on the High Street, 14 are new businesses. 33 part-time and 26 full-time job positions have been created within the last 2 years. All the businesses are independent and firm advocates for shopping locally, so much so that they have formed a group in order to help local collaborative initiatives.

South Craven Together was set up to promote and support the local businesses, services and groups within the community and to showcase the area as a vibrant, welcoming and useful resource for all.

The Group firmly believe in the shop locally mantra and assert that it not only benefits

the individual, but also the community.

Shopping locally helps to build stronger communities by sustaining cohesive town centres; it helps to promote community wellbeing by linking the surrounding areas in both social and economic relationships, in addition to this it also means that revenue is kept within the area.

COUNTRY COOKING & FORAGING FOR FOOD

For the promotion of Health & Wellbeing by Cath Bromwich



This summer I have been captivated by the simple flavours you can make by making syrups out of herbs, flowers and anything else you

like. Elderflower is the obvious one but I have also ventured to mint, rosemary and made a new type of lemonade the other day. Oh yes, and there was the rowan lemonade that I was going to try. I will get on with that! Someone suggested chive syrup but I was not sure they had got the idea about things tasting nice! The thing that I really love about making syrups is that you can capture one distance flavour so effectively and it is really quite surprising to taste in a drink for the first time. A group I was working with had this experience with the mint syrup we ended up with. We really were not sure whether it would be nice but found it very thirst quenching standing over our fire that we had just been cooking on.

Additionally you can take one single flavour and add others. In this way you can make up a more complicated concoction and it is, for me, just taking cooking right back to being very simple. You are not even dealing with texture of a food, only flavour and that comes from the world around us in a natural form. So much of what we eat is complicated and at times unidentifiable; it is nice to be simple sometimes! I am off later this week to a gardening club award day to run them a session on exactly this. They will be given different syrups to taste and be asked to guess them. They will then be able to make different concoctions of their own. There is something very reminiscent of childhood in that and I hope they enjoy being creative with their senses.

Something else that is nice about making syrups is that you are capturing something of that season and can store it for a more

opportune time. This makes me feel very much like a squirrel preparing for our winter months! However in my household the nicest syrups do not very often last that long however much you make!

Top tip: Use your syrups in drinks or to add to deserts, pour on cakes, over pancakes or into sorbets and ice-creams. You can freeze them as ice-cubes if you want them to last longer and be available easily during winter, although stored in a bottle in the fridge they will last a good time.

Syrup with any flavouring:

Full credit for this recipe goes to Darina Allen and is taken from Forgotten Skills published by Kyle Cathie



1 (450g) pint of cold water. 1 LB (600ml) sugar, a few sprigs of whatever herb you are using

(number of sprigs depends on how pungent they are). Put all the ingredients into a pan, dissolve the sugar, bring to the boil, simmer for 2 minutes, then leave to cool. To make lemonade decant 8fl oz (225 ml) of the syrup and add 3 squeezed lemons and approximately 1½ pints (700ml) water (still or fizzy) and ice. Taste and make it as weak or as strong as you like.

Leeds City College Star Centre

A part-time Astronomy GCSE course, aimed at enthusiasts and amateur stargazers, is scheduled to relaunch this month in Keighlev after some stellar results over the last two years.

16 year-old Cassie Barlow-Hall from Silsden was among the latest group of learners of all ages studying the GCSE part time at The STAR Centre at Keighley Campus, Leeds City College. She was over the moon after getting an A* grade in August, which she hopes will help her fulfil her ambition of studying astrophysics at university.

The STAR Centre is a specialist science hub that uses space as a theme to encourage learners into undertaking STEM subjects -Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. The GCSE course runs half-day a week for a year. Learning is in a small group size and

covers topics ranging from our solar system, to the history of astrophysics, the life cycle of stars and our place in the universe.

For Cassie, who heard about the course from a friend, it was studying the big bang theory and how the universe was formed that really captured her imagination. It is a subject she is keen to pursue further through maths and sciences A Levels and eventually at university: "The Astronomy GCSE was as interesting as I had hoped - it's a subject that fascinates me. The STAR Centre provided exciting surroundings in which to study and it was great to have such an enthusiastic tutor who knew the subject so well."

The course welcomes astronomy enthusiasts of all ages and with different levels of experience who are keen to explore their interest on a deeper level.

Next month Diane, the Aire Valley Mag distribution manager, is planning a 10 mile sponsored walk in the Worth Valley. The walk, now in it's 6th year, formerly known as Waggoners' Walk, supports the charity 'Embrace: Child Victims of Crime'.

A retired police officer, Diane has worked with children and families whose lives have been devastated by the criminal acts of others. Over the years while serving in active duty Diane requested support from Embrace when children had been left motherless through crime.

Jack was only 8 years old when his mother was unlawfully killed. After working on the case Diane referred Jack and his grandmother, Margaret to the charity.

Embrace aims to create new positive experiences for children and young people and to put some joy back in their lives. Jack and Margaret were treated to a special trip to Disneyland in Florida along with others who had suffered in similar ways. Afterwards, Margaret said, "We'd all gone through it a bit, what with the court case and what have you. The case finishing is like an anti-climax and then your life starts again. In Florida we went to Seaworld to see the dolphins and the whales and Jack wanted to sit at the front because the children all knew they would get wet through. It was not until we met up afterwards that we realised we'd both been crying our eyes out. When it was all done Jack had been crying all the time and I had been crying all the time. It was so emotional; the music and the whales. I felt better afterwards as though there had been a release. Jack told me he'd missed his mummy.

Maybe the show had been a trigger.'

Jack declared the whole trip 'Great!' and Margaret continued, 'He still talks about it and looks at the photographs. It was happy times. He thought of his mummy while he was there so it helped him in that way to talk about his mummy. I don't think he will ever forget it.'

Asked what the trip meant to her, Margaret said, 'It can make such a big difference to a family that has been through trauma. When you have a special time you keep going back in your mind to it and it gives you a lift. I never knew the police could be so kind because you do not hear about what happens behind the scenes. I've had my eyes opened. With what you go through you think they've got their conviction, everything is sorted and then you are forgotten. Well you are not forgotten. It is just good to know that they help the survivors.'

Seeing first hand the benefit of the charity's work, Diane made a personal

pledge to raise funds for Embrace so that there would always be money available for other children. So far, with the assistance of Worth Valley residents Mel and Rob from Oxenhope, and other friends, neighbours and police colleagues, both serving and retired, Diane has raised over £13,000.

This years walk has been aptly re-named the 'Wuthering Hike.' It will start (and finish) at The Wuthering Heights Pub in Stanbury at 10:30am on Sunday the 12th of October, 2014.
