STRATEGIES FOR SUCCESS AT SCHOOL

Things you can do to help your child at school Today the pressure to succeed at school begins even earlier than ever. Children in nursery and Key Stages 1 & 2 are held to a standard of success that their parents never had to worry about. While in the past those first few years of schooling were pressure free and simply intended to introduce children to formal education. today children are tested on their knowledge and ability within the first weeks of Reception and that testing continues throughout the rest of their public school education. There are several simple steps every parent can take to give their child the edge at school.

Bedtime routine - Make sure your child has enough sleep the night before. Many parents do not send their children to bed until they themselves go to bed. Growing children need between 10-12 hours of sleep a night. While there are a few children who seem to require less, the majority of children need at least this much.

Mind what they eat - Make sure your child has a good breakfast and is provided with a good lunch and snack. Growing children need to eat frequently. They should never be sent to school on any empty stomach and they should not be expected to succeed at school for an entire day without regular meals and snacks.

Think practically about clothes - Make sure your child is appropriately dressed for the day and their school environment. When the weather is hot make sure they are dressed in cool clothing, when the weather is cold make sure they are dressed in warm clothing. When the weather or school environment is changeable then provide layers so the child can adjust accordingly.

Your attitude counts - Your attitude toward school and your child's education is vitally important. If you send the message that school is not important, that the teacher is not worthy of respect, and that your child's learning is not essential then your child will receive that message loud and clear. Get involved - Know your child's teachers and school administration. Be familiar with their classroom, routine, special events, and assignments. The more you know about your child's school life then the more proactive you can be to head off potential problems and help them succeed in school. Professional Tutoring - You may want to seek professional advice early if your child is falling behind or does not progress in step with their peers. If your child is doing exams this year then preparation is the key to success. Weak areas need to be highlighted as early as possible. COUNTRY COOKING & FORAGING

Fun with Fools Kids love this simple fruit recipe, but don't be fooled, it's for grown ups too!

This time of year you can pick your own fruit to add. It needs to be ripe but still have a few pieces with that sharp tang to them. Fool can be made with cream and full fat custard, which is delicious. However this simple, low fat option is also really good, and beats the fancy, shop-bought equivalents on taste and price. You can even use a budget powdered custard, getting a lovely pudding for less than one pound, including the sugar, if you picked your own fruit. Shop around for the packets of frozen fruit, because their price varies.

I first fell for fools when, as kids, we had gooseberry fool. It was really good and took most of the sharpness out of eating gooseberries, while leaving just enough to challenge all that soft cream that was in it. Yum! One reason kids love this is that you strain out the pips. I like it because of the amazing swirls of vibrant contrasting colour that you get as you stir the fruit into the custard and yoghurt. For everyone, it is a great way of eating up all this lovely seasonal fruit.

FRUIT FOOL



Ingredients:

500g low fat custard (ready made). 500g low fat yoghurt

500g freshly picked summer fruit (e.g. blackberries, raspberries, elderberries, blackcurrants and strawberries) or a 500g packet of frozen summer fruit

A little sugar Instructions:

Put the fruit in a pan with very little water. Heat gently until defrosted (if frozen) and just cooked. You will want the blackcurrants to burst - if any remain whole, squash them slightly against the side of the pan, to avoid sour surprises! Once this is done, your fruit is cooked.

Taste and add sugar if the fruit is very sour. I find 2-3 dessertspoons is enough. (The custard will add some sweetness, so do not put in too much.)

Cool the fruit, then strain through a sieve into a bowl. Use a spoon to help some of the flesh through.

Stir in the custard and voahurt, mixing thoroughly. Chill in the fridge until serving



As the title suggests you will be walking on the hill tops where even in summer the breeze can be quite cool, therefore it is advisable that you dress for the season and include an extra sweater a waterproof coat, and strong footwear.

This walk is not suitable for wheelchair and pushchair users or people with limited mobility.

If you are confident that you can walk the distance this

walk is suitable for reasonably fit occasional walkers and has the advantage of starting near the top of the hill, therefore there is no prolonged climbing.


It is advisable to print out the description of the route. Go to www.bradford.gov.uk/countryside and click on Self guided walks, then Haworth Stanbury and The Worth Valley, and finally, Hill Top Hamlets.

HARDEN MOOR - OPEN COUNTRY

Due to the maze of paths over the moor it is quite difficult to write an accurate route, however the author of the walk has attempted to the follow the public footpath which crosses the moor and hopes that you will be able to follow in his footsteps. If all else fails make your own way the best you can uphill onto the top of the moor from where you will be able to see the telephone mast straight ahead. Then using your walk map and the mast you should be able to work out which way to walk to get you back on the right track so that you end up at the top right hand corner of the moorland at the kissing gate near the junction of three rough tracks (GR SE 071393). **Reservoir** Good luck!



PUTTING FEET FIRST

What is plantar fasciitis?

The plantar fascia is a band of tissue under the foot that stabilises the arch and acts as a shock absorber protecting the underlying soft tissues during walking (gait) Repeated pulling of this such as overuse injuries e.g. sporting activities, excessive pronation of the ankle joint (subtalar joint) are



potential contributory factors leading to degenerative changes of the plantar fascia resulting in plantar fasciitis.

Plantar fasciitis is reported to be usually self-limiting. Typical symptoms that may be present when first weight bearing in the morning and perhaps during periods of inactivity are: throbbing, searing, piercing pain.

What can you do about it?

Footwear - Shoes or trainers with a lace up or fastening and thicker soles may help, especially for those people who walk/stand for long periods. Footwear should have good shock absorption. Sometimes use of orthotics may have to be considered to provide shock absorption and/or control any biomechanical dysfunction occurring in the foot/ankle.

Cold therapy - this may help in the initial

stages; reducing pain and swelling. Application of a cold stimulus (e.g. ice pack) provides an analgesic effect. However, prolonged application should be avoided. Contraindications include patients with peripheral vascular disease, neuropathy and vasospastic disorders (e.g. Raynaud's). Suggested cold therapy can be achieved by rolling the foot over an iced can/ bottle, which provides a combination of cold therapy and stretching of the plantar fascia.

INGROW LOCO

The railway is full of gems that it's all too easy to take for granted and to miss something very special as a result. I hope that we've all marvelled at Oakworth Station, in all its Edwardian glory with its Railway Children charm; Keighley station with a very different character, bringing the railway into town and which has been the backdrop for many a filmmaker wanting an urban location as a result; the diminutive Damems; the now-tranquil Oxenhope, but which once boasted a bustling goods yard; and Haworth,

where passengers alight for the village or to catch a glimpse of the engineering magic that goes on in the locomotive works. But Ingrow (West) station is all too overlooked.

Ingrow (East) closed to passengers in 1955 and was on the line that once took passengers from Keighley to Queensbury. Ingrow (West) station continues to thrive and is home to both the Bahamas Locomotive Society (BLS) and the Vintage Carriages Trust (VCT) each with a museum that's well worth

a visit. BLS' 'Ingrow Loco' museum tells the story of their star locomotive 'Bahamas' and their recently restored education carriage will soon be welcoming visitors, particularly school groups to learn about the railway.

The VCT's 'Museum of Rail Travel' gives an insight into how passengers have been catered for since Victorian times. The station building itself has a fascinating story to tell... when we reopened the railway in 1968 the station had been vandalised to a point that made it beyond repair. It took until 1989 for Ingrow to be brought back to its former glory, which we did by dismantling and relocating stone-by-stone the Midland Railway station building from Foulridge in Lancashire on the former Skipton to Colne line. Inside the station building is a pictorial history of the relocation, and as the branch was a Midland Railway line, the building looks just like it has always been there. **S**ince the reopening of the station in

1989, we have worked with our partners to develop the site, relaying the stone sets and restoring the Midland Railway goods sheds, in which the Ingrow Loco museum is now housed. Over the past year have been developing a plan to make the site even more appealing and you may have noticed the first part of the plan, which was a series of family-friendly events in recent months, including a summer celebration of the history of railway excursions to the

seaside for which we brought a beach to Ingrow-by-the-sea.

Passengers with Day Rover railway tickets get free entry to the BLS and VCT museums, so can combine a visit with a journey on the railway. Details of what there is to see and do at Ingrow can be found via www.KWVR.co.uk or by searching for 'Museum of Rail Travel' and 'Ingrow Loco'


Not only is the new Centre proving a hit with local schools and employers, it is also offering a great alternative to traditional educational routes with places available on Apprenticeships starting this September.

The facility, which was launched in January 2015, includes state-of-the-art computer driven machinery, computeraided design software, and 3D printers. It is run in partnership between local employers, Bradford Council and Oakbank School.

The Centre offers a viable alternative to academic studies with a variety of qualifications available in engineering and manufacturing. Students over 16 taking an engineering apprenticeship can learn practical skills while being paid to learn with very good career prospects in a booming industry.

Business Operations Manager, Chris Stott, said: "The number of companies getting involved with the Centre of Excellence for Advanced Manufacturing and Engineering illustrates how well manufacturing in the area is performing; however, many young people are not aware of the opportunities in the sector.

"This is a great time for young people to get involved in engineering and manufacturing – there are jobs available, many of them well paid and with genuine career prospects."




