WINED & DINED with Claire Smith from No.10 The Coffee House



There has been much media coverage recently about the therapeutic benefits of cooking and in particular, baking.

Mary Berry was featured in The Mail last week, the heading of her article stating that "Baking helped to heal my broken heart." In it she revealed that after her nineteen year old son died in a car accident, cooking was the only way she knew how to regain some normality in her life.

Novelist Marian Keyes, after suffering from depression, has just launched her latest book which is entitled "Saved by Cake" in which she presents a similar argument – that baking helped her through some of the darkest hours. Baking it seems, is big news at the moment.

Whether it be baking a cake, grinding the spices for a gloriously tasty main or simply stirring a bowl of rich, deep chocolate (which to me is like gazing into the depths of another world), cooking is the same as painting a picture with colours or words, It doesn't matter how abstract or humble the end product is; the process of creation will satisfy the senses- help you to connect to something deep within.

At the end of a particularly stressful day last week I was making a batch of orange creams for next day's dessert (they need to set overnight). The custard takes a long time to thicken and has to be stirred continuously until it begins to do so. The warmth of the kitchen and the heady citrus aroma and the deeply frothing, honey-coloured syrup were so soothing and comforting that as I stirred I felt the stress of the day just falling away.

Anyone who has seen the film Julie and Julia, which documents the lives of two women from verv different walks of life, will already be familiar with this philosophy. Julia Childs who is wealthy, and childless discovers a passion for food, cooking, and writing about both, that provide her with the meaning and focus lacking in her privileged lifestyle. Julie, though coming from an entirely different background to Julia finds the same kind of fulfilment through her own love of food and cooking. To quote her character when she arrives home after a very bad day at work and decides to try lifting her spirits by making chocolate cream pie; "You know what I love about cooking, I love that after a day when nothing is sure, and when I say nothing I mean nothing; you can come home and absolutely know that if you add egg yolks to chocolate, sugar and milk it will get thick. It's such a comfort."

I tend to agree. Your kitchen holds all the potential of becoming your sanctuary. A place which enfolds you and in which you can immerse yourself in the preparation of whatever it is that will soothe away the troubles of the day; - even if that happens to be nothing more than a cup of tea.

Join us and Walk!

Take a Step is the theme for Fairtrade Fortnight (27 Feb -11 March) a national campaign to get everyone to take what steps they can to make a small change which will support Fairtrade producers and raise awareness of the difference you could make to the poorest farmers and workers in developing countries by swapping to Fairtrade products.

Local Fairtrade groups are joining forces with Fairtrade Bradford and inviting people to join them on The Fair Trade Way, a circular walking route linking all the the district's Fairtrade places, Bradford, Bingley, Shipley, Baildon, Burley, Ilkley, Haworth, Denholme and Thornton. The Bradford Zone walks will eventually form part of a network covering the country, originating in Garstang Lancashire the World's first Fairtrade Town.

The 9 walks are: Bradford to Bingley on March 10 Bingley to Shipley on March 17 Shipley to Baildon on March 24 Baildon to Burley on March 31 Burley to Ilkley on April 14

Ilkley to Haworth on April 21 Haworth to Denholme on April 28 Denholme to Thornton on May 5; and Thornton to Bradford Centenary Square on May 12 . (World Fair Trade Day)



Ilkley to Haworth April 21st. After walking from Ilkley to Keighley, the walkers will be met in Haworth by the Rainbow Morris Dancers having travelled on the Keighley and Worth Valley Railway.

Next stop for Fairtrade refreshments at Haworth Old Hall before walking up Main Street to enjoy a play in the garden of the Bronte Parsonage. IBruce Crowther from Garstang will be joining



this walk and we would encourage everyone to take this opportunity to learn more about Fairtrade and maybe try a sample or two!

Haworth to Denholme 28th April

Meeting at Haworth Old Hall walkers can enjoy a Fairtrade breakfast before setting off at 12.30 for Denholme where they will be met by the Denholme Fairtrade group at the Mechanics Institute at about 2.30.

The Speed of Broadband

Using the internet is second nature to most of us these days. However the benefits can be limited by the speed of the connection. In the early days using dial-up Internet could mean a wait of several minutes for an email to download. For many of us the development of broadband systems has taken the speeds of these connections up by about 180 times. This means that live gaming, TV

and radio are now being available on your computer via the Internet.

In 2011 Bradford's average broadband speed was highest of all UK cities at just over 6 mbps. Unfortunately these are

not available to everyone.

Bradford Council wants to build on this and is currently developing projects that will make the latest Superfast Broadband of 24Mbs available to the majority of premises by 2015.

The benefits of this fast system are:

Flexible working for people to have an improved quality of life through having more control over where and when they choose to work, with home broadband connections as powerful as in a city office.

People with disabilities or caring responsibilities who would find it hard to travel to work could work from home

Older people may be able to stay in their house and enjoy 'telecare' at home or in the doctors surgery

• Online learning available to allow people to reach their full potential

• Companies can work with customers in new and exciting ways offering the potential for growth and job creation.

However achieving this target is not going to be easy. In some communities the Broadband suppliers such as BT, Virgin, Orange, and Plusnet need to know that there is a demand for this product before they make it available. You can help us by asking them for access to 24Mbs broadband.

In some of the smaller villages

there may be technical problems in making Superfast Broadband available. The residents of the Worth Valley have recognised this and have formed their own group FibreValley to look at the options (http://

fibrevalley.net]. They are even thinking of setting up their own network with a specialist community broadband company.

If you are thinking of getting together as a community to look at increasing the broadband speed drop me an email and I will let you know what help there is.

Support and friendship for families

What is Home-Start?

Home-Start is a national voluntary organisation offering informal, friendly support to parents with at least one child under the age of five.

Being a parent, wherever you live, whatever your circumstances, isn't always easy. Add in pressures such as illness or financial worries, and without the support of family and friends nearby, the stress can seem overwhelming.

Home-Start offers free support, friendship and practical help to families with at least one child

under five. Families are visited regularly in their own homes by volunteers who have all had experience of parenting and know how hard it can sometimes be.

Home-Start Craven seeks volunteers to support local families in the Craven area. Could YOU help us make a difference for families?

YOU could have the skills needed to make a difference to a family living locally.

As a parent you'll know just exactly how tough it can sometimes be. Did you often long to have someone to confide in or just have a chat with?

Home-Start's families come in all shapes and sizes and from all different

backgrounds. Some may be feeling isolated, they may be new to the area without the support of family and friends, or they may be parenting alone. Others may be struggling with difficult relationships, have an illness or a disability, or have several pre-school children. All have one thing in common, the need for someone to listen and be there just for them.

Home-Start volunteers also come in all shapes and sizes and from all different backgrounds. We need people with a whole host of different experiences to provide our special kind of support to families.

Will I be the right sort of person to support a family?

Home-Start volunteers are all ages and from all walks of life. All we ask of you is that you have experience of bringing up children and can spare a few hours a week. Initially we ask you to complete a 'Volunteer preparation course' these courses are run regularly and are free. The course usually takes place one day per week for around 10 weeks. Both day time and evening courses may be available. Volunteers will all have to agree to undergo a full enhanced CRB check and provide 2 references. Home-Start values its volunteers highly and provides full support and training and all out of pocket expenses are reimbursed

If you or anyone else you know, think you can spare a few hours a week to become a friend to someone in their own home in the Craven area, we would love to hear from you.

The Humble Crumble

Sometimes, less is more. Simple is smart; sublime. In the case of the great British crumble both statements are true. As rhubarb is in season, and the very best tender forced variety is readily available, a humble crumble is sure to hit the spot.

With its vibrant pink exterior, and acid green flesh, the tangy taste of spring is held within rhubarb's leggy stalks.

Sugar is essential to tame the beast but don't be tempted to overdo it; tangy and tart works well. Remember, it is likely to be doused in cream, ice cream, or custard, so there is plenty of opportunity for sweetening.



Rhubarb Crumble 101

Serves: 6 Ingredients:

 large eating apple, peeled cored and sliced
 stalks rhubarb, thickly sliced
 3 tablespoons caster sugar

Crumble topping:

100g flour 125g caster sugar 60g rolled oats 60g butter 30g chopped nuts



Preparation method:

Prep: 10 mins | Cook: 45 mins 1. Preheat oven to 200 degrees C / gas mark 6.

2. Combine apple and rhubarb in an oven-proof dish; sprinkle over sugar.

3. In food processor, combine flour, sugar, butter, oats and nuts. Blend until you have a nice, crumbly mixture.

4. Spread over the top of apple/ ruhbarb mix.

5. Bake in preheated oven for 45 mins or until top is golden and fruit mix is bubbly.

6. Serve with custard, cream or vanilla ice-cream.

Anxiety affects every individual in a

different way due to the fact they are a group of related conditions rather than a single disorder, and can look very different from person to person. Despite their different forms, all anxiety disorders share one major symptom: persistent or severe fear or worry in situations where most people wouldn't feel threatened.

There are a number of emotional symptoms of anxiety to consider including: feelings of apprehension or dread, trouble concentrating, feeling tense and jumpy, anticipating the worst and feeling like your mind's gone blank.

One individual may suffer from intense anxiety attacks that strike without warning, while another gets panicky at the thought of mingling at a party. Someone else may struggle with a disabling fear of driving, or uncontrollable, intrusive thoughts. Yet another may live in a constant state of tension, worrying about anything and everything.

Anxiety is not just about emotional feeling but it is also about the physical symptoms as well, these include things such as a pounding heart, sweating, stomach upset or dizziness, shortness of breath, tremors and twitches, muscle tension, headaches fatigue and insomnia.

The worst thing about this type of illness is the anxiety attacks that people suffer from which can often have a huge impact on their daily living and how they function.

Anxiety attacks, also known as panic attacks, are episodes of intense panic or fear. Anxiety attacks usually occur suddenly and without warning. Sometimes there's an obvious trigger— getting stuck in an elevator, for example, but in other cases, the attacks come out of the blue.

Anxiety attacks usually peak within ten minutes, and they rarely last more than thirty minutes. But during that short time, the terror can be so severe that you feel as if you're about to die or totally lose control. The physical symptoms of anxiety attacks are themselves so frightening that many people believe they're having a heart attack. After an anxiety attack is over, you may be worried about having another one, particularly in a public place where help isn't available or you can't easily escape.

Again some of the more common symptoms of anxiety attacks include: a surge of overwhelming panic, feeling of losing control or going crazy, heart palpitations or chest pain, feeling like you're going to pass out, hyperventilation, hot flushes or chills and feeling detached or unreal.

Finally there are six major types of anxiety disorders, generalized anxiety disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder, panic disorder (anxiety attacks), phobia, post-traumatic stress disorder, and social anxiety disorder. In the next edition we will look at how to tackle anxiety with the use of some advice on relaxation techniques.
