




WINED AND DINED by Claire Smith



Most of you will have come to realise that I am almost evangelical when it comes to cookina: the satisfaction, the sheer pleasure of selecting, slicing, stirring, steaming,

sizzling and inhaling the exotic combination of aromas as I cook is, in my book, one of lifes greatest pleasures. Imagine then my delight when I picked up a newspaper this week to find an unexpected ally in the form of Harvard professor Richard Wrangham. whose new book " Catching Fire" makes so bold as to state that the greatest scientific discovery in history, the seminal moment in human evolution. was the moment the human race learnt to cook.

According to Wrangham, forest fires would occasionally deliver cooked meat or vegetation, and early man learned to produce sparks with rocks and flint, using fire to keep predators at bay: any meat falling into the fire would have tasted delicious.

Two million years ago, therefore, when man first acquired a taste for cooked food, our brains began to develop (cooking increases the calorific value of food making it easier to digest leaving time and energy for the development of an evolving human brain), our jaws became smaller, we learned



to co-operate, developed social skills and strategic intelligence. Certain types of root vegetable, inedible when raw, would have been transformed by the cooking process aiving greater scope to the range of foods available: being able to plan meals ahead gave rise to the family as we know it . In fact cooking, states Wrangham, made us human.

This is an argument I can go with. I know that some of you have little or no interest in cooking and lets face it, in todays world we don't actually need to cook. We can nuke something in the microwave and the streets of every town are heaving with takeaways. But we often have no idea of the provenence of the food we eat or it's effect upon our health. More importantly, we have absolutely no connection with the food we eat and with which we fuel our bodies and our lives. Surely this implies that we are going in the opposite direction to our predecessors.

I am not advocating that we must only ever eat perfectly balanced nutritional meals. I eat cake every day (I live for cake- I blame my sweet tooth over which I have absolutely no control) and after a long, hard working day I don't always feel like cooking (which usually means that my partner, Billy, has to dash off to our favourite Thai restaurant for a take away]. But life is all about balance. Selecting your own food, touching, tasting, nibbling as you cook - in fact cooking with all your senses well and truly switched on is a pleasure too great to miss.

PLANT POT TO STEW POT

There's a lot of publicity these days about 'growing your own' and allotments. Ten years ago there were empty plots on most sites, but today would be Percy Thrower's could be faced with many years wait to get a much coveted allotment..

For those of us who have to make do with the garden space that we have, the best way forward is to take a trick or two from the original English Cottage gardener, and to put your veg and herbs in with the flower borders. Even if you only have a yard or windowsill there are things you can grow in tubs, pots, or growbags.



My tiny plot (on the edge of the moors in a very exposed site) shows what you can do with a very small space (the area shown is 8' by 12'). It makes the most of the vertical area with green beans and climbing french beans, then there are courgettes, fennel, parsley, strawberries in beds and containers, growing amongst sweet peas, nasturtiums, calendula, and roses.

The good news is – you can get on with it straight away; yes, even in October! Part of the bed shown is bare – we've got it ready for the Onion Sets and Garlic which we will plant in October and crop at the beginning of Summer 2010. All you need is to get the right autumn planting variety, and for the small scale gardener many garden centres help out now, by selling multi-packs with a few of each type. (You're better not to use the supermarket kitchen Garlic, as the type may not be suitable to growing in the cooler, North of England.)

Garlic is a good crop to grow, as it takes little room and unless you eat a whole bulb a day (good for the heart but not so conducive to keeping your friends) you will be able to grow enough to keep you going all year. It usually keeps through until the next crop is ready if you keep it cool.

Other things you can plant now are spring cabbage, but you will need more room for that, and of course herbs. Parsley and thyme are very hardy and will grow over winter, and they make a very fresh and welcome addition to the pot.

This isn't meant to be a how to... just a few ideas to help you get started. After all, it is unlikely that you would be able to grow enough even on 2 allotments to be self-sufficient, so it is more about choosing a few things to grow which give you a variety and give you the best return which is why garlic and herbs are a good choice.

The main point is to enjoy both the growing and the eating! Wildlife certainly like the combination, and hopefully you will too.

Going green with The Forest of Bradford

In 1997 a small group of enthusiastic individuals planted an area of woodland at the foot of an old quarry site in Bradford. This was the start of the "Forest of Bradford" project which has run since that time planting over 350,000 trees across the district, the equivalent of over 120 hectares of new native woodland.

The district as a whole has one of the lowest levels of woodland / tree cover in the country, a fact that is being addressed by planting around 30,000 trees each winter. The trees planted are native to the country including Oak, Ah, Silver Birch, Holly and Hazel. As well as native woodland the project also plant hedgerows creating new wildlife corridors and linking fragmented woodland areas. One of the commonest questions asked of us is " where is the forest ? ", in fact it is planted across hundreds of individual sites ranging in size from a field corner to larger whole field sites. It is not our intention to plant trees every where, only where it is appropriate, avoiding other areas of wildlife interest or historical value.

Each year Forest of Bradford benefits from hundreds of volunteers who help plant the trees and care for them in the following months. It doesn't matter if people have planted before or not, every one is welcome if they have time to give. Over the winter period planting days are held on most Saturdays and on Wednesdays throughout the year. Much of the planting over the last ten years has been in the Worth Valley, and we are continually seeking landowners who have an interest in establishing woodland or hedgerows on their land. The project can grant aid appropriate schemes through its fund raising efforts and carry out the aftercare on the trees for two years to ensure their survival.



RURAL MATTERS DAIRY FARMERS OF BRITAIN COLLAPSE by Rachael Moore

Did you know there has been a 37% fall in milk producer numbers in West and North Yorkshire in the past seven years? Continue at this rate and we'll all be buying powered milk.

In September 2002 1,201 West & North Yorkshire producers contributed to the 14 billion litres of milk produced in the UK. More recently, in August 2009, just 755 producers supplied to the UK total of 12 billion litres. Considering the population is rising, demand must be higher? Dairy farmers have a product that consumers want, surely this falls into the general supply and demand theory where consumer pays more for a highly sought after commodity? Obviously not in the UK.

Welfare and traceability standards in the UK are some of the most comprehensive in the world. For a small island, we have high expectations. I don't want to knock this, British farmers should be proud of it, but so too should the consumers.

Once the cow has been milked and the milk cooled in a large tank to be collected by the milk tanker, it goes to a large processing plant. Then it is in the hands of the processing companies, one of whom you may recognise, Dairy Farmers of Britain. DFB then paid the suppliers (farmers) an average of 16p per litre for the milk.

There were signs in early 2008 of DFB struggling to make sound returns. Suppliers were always paid a few pence per litre less for their milk than other processers such as Arla Asda, FirstMilk, Wisemans etc, but this was all on the understanding that the premium was cut to enable the farmers co-operative to strengthen in the market place. What members were not told outright was their producer owned company DFB was in hot water.

On 3rd June 2009 it was announced that Dairy Farmers of Britain was taken into receivership. Milk produced in May, worth £19 million to the UK dairy industry. was lost: no payment was received for UK dairy producers part of DFB. This left 190 farms in Yorkshire no alternative milk buver and no option but to sell to the receiver at 10p per litre, way below production costs. It is estimated that 85% of return on milk is used to pay bills. Cows still need feeding regardless of the milk price, bills still need paying and with such uncertainty at where the next source of income would be ex-DFB farmers were up in arms.

This Industry blip has affected some farms more than others. Generally the smaller herds milking around 40-80 cows have been hit the hardest. Processers are not interested in sending haulage to outlying farms for a small drop of milk as it eats into their profits. They have no obligation to collect the milk, but this leaves smaller farms, much like the ones in West Yorkshire in a compromising position.

Since June, it has been noted in the Worth & Aire Vallies that a number of farmers have ceased milk production, favouring enterprises requiring less capital investment and hopefully more market security. I know of 5 farms ceasing production this summer and I'm sure there will be more. Have you noticed the decrease in Holstein cows in the fields around where you live?





Have you lost your connection?

All viewers with a Freeview digital TV or box (including homes with Top Up TV and BT Vision) will need to re-tune their equipment after lunchtime on Wednesday 30 September 2009, to continue receiving their available digital channels.

Analogue (viewers with just four or five channels), satellite and cable viewers will not be affected.

This re-tune is required to pave the way for Channel Five to become as widely available on Freeview as the other terrestrial channels at digital television switchover. In addition technical preparations for future improvements to the Freeview service (such as the availability of Freeview HD channels) are being made. To retune or digibox you will either need to follow your instruction manual or you could contact a specialist for assistance.


Fit for Purpose HAWORTH PHYSIO




Paws up for Penistone!



What is equity release?

The equity you have in your property is the open market value, minus any mortgage or loan secured against it.

An equity release plan allows you to release tax-free cash from your home to boost your finances in retirement without the need to move.

Who aualifies for eauity release? Generally you must fulfil the following criteria:

Be aged 55 - 95.

Own your own home.

This home must be worth a minimum of £50.000

Have little or no mortgage - any outstanding mortgage must be repaid with the cash released.

The property must be freehold or leasehold with a minimum remaining lease period of 75 years.

The property must be of standard construction.

What equity release plans are available?

There are four types of equity release plans:

Lifetime mortgages - a loan secured against the property, which accrues interest until the loan plus interest is repaid when the property is sold, usually on entry into long-term care or death. They are available to homeowners 55+, with little or no mortgage outstanding. You can typically release 18-50% of the value of your home, depending on age. Home reversion plans - part or all of the property is sold in exchange for a tax-free

cash lump sum and a guaranteed lifetime lease with no monthly repayments to meet. Drawdown plans - a drawdown lifetime mortgage has the same advantages and disadvantages as a regular lifetime mortgage, as well as a few more that are unique to this kind of equity release scheme. The main difference with a drawdown plan is that the full sum of money available to you isn't released immediately. Instead, you decide on a maximum amount of equity you want to release, and 'drawdown' the cash in stages when vou want to.

Home income plans - with a home income plan, equity is release through a lifetime mortgage or home reversion plan and is automatically invested into an annuity that is built into the plan, to generate an income for life. A cash lump sum may be available in addition to an income, but the amount may be restricted.

What safeguards are in place to protect you?

Look for SHIP approved plans that come with a set of guarantees to ensure your safety including:

The right to remain in your home for as long as vou choose.

The freedom to move to another property without financial penalty (subject to lenders' criteria)

That you will receive a cash lump sum or a regular income.

That you will never fall into negative equity no matter what happens to house prices in the future.

Nel's Pumpkin Pie (yum yum!)



ack O 'Lanterns made from a pumpkin and tealights can now be seen grinning (or even gurning) scarily out of many a window around Halloween. Its not a bad thing to do with a pumpkin, but I can think of several better ones... most involving pie and cream, although it makes a stunning risotto or soup; (see www.pamperedchef.biz/nel for recipes).

Although thought of as an American dish, the name

pumpkin originated from the Greek word for "large melon" which is "pepon." This became pompom in French, and then pompion in English, and then pumpkin by the time it landed in America with the earliest European settlers in the 1670s. The Native Americans grew squash and pumpkins, and traded these with the settlers; hence the link with Thanksgiving around the same time. Pumpkin Pie can be made with any sort of squash if you can't get hold of a pumpkin - and almost every bit can be used.

First scoop out the stringy soft part that holds the seeds and discard. The seeds can be washed and spread out on a baking sheet, lightly salted and then baked in a low oven for around half an hour until crisp. Scoop out the firm flesh to make the filling for this delicious pie, and keep the hollowed out skin for your Jack O'Lantern!



Ingredients:

500g pumpkin or squash flesh (usually about a $1 \frac{1}{2}$ kg pumpkin) 1 500g block shortcrust pastry (or home made) 3 eaas 1tsp ground cinnamon ¹/₂tsp ground nutmeg ¹/₂tsp ground ginger 150g soft brown sugar 150ml double cream (a small pot) 2 tbsp maple syrup or golden syrup

Heat oven to gas mark 6/ electirc 200 / fan 180

Roll out the pastry on a silicone mat or lightly floured surface into a 30cm disc. Use this to line a large, shallow pie dish, with a few centimetres of pastry hanging over the side. Chill in the fridge for about 20 minutes. Blind bake the pastry case by filling with scrunched up greaseproof paper and some baking beans (or dried beans) and baking for 15 mins, take out the paper and beans, and cook for another 10 mins until golden. Turn oven down to gas mark 3 / electric 160 / fan 140

If you want to keep the pumpkin intact for a Jack O' Lantern, slice off the top and keep on one side. Scoop out the seeds and the flesh (a melon baller works really well for this!) Put the pumpkin pieces in a large microwaveable bowl and cook covered on full power for about 12 - 15 minutes until soft . Drain in a sieve (the pumpkin will have reduced dramatically in volume - this is supposed to happen!). Leave to cool (it doesn't have to be completely cold)

Beat the cooled pumpkin together with



the sugar, eggs, cream, syrup and spices (or whizz in a blender) until smooth. Pour into the pastry case and bake for aound an hour. The filling will rise up in the middle, and then sink down when you take it out. Leave to cool and serve with cream or crème fraiche, with a drizzle of maple syrup if you have some.

While its cooking, draw a scary face on your squash or pumpkin, and cut it through with a small sharp knife. Put a tea light inside, and place the top of the pumpkin back on top like a hat. Turn off the lights and SCREEEEAM - you will need a nice slice of pie with some cream or crème fraiche and a drizzle of maple syrup to recover!


